# CAN I VOTE IN THE U.S. IF I HAVE A DISABILITY?

Voting laws in the U.S. have been changing since the U.S. Constitution was signed in 1776. At the time, only a small group of individuals could vote. This group included white males who owned land and were at least 21 years old.

Now, voting laws are much different. The right to vote is given to all U.S. citizens who have not been disenfranchised (or stripped of their right to vote). But what about those with mental and/or physical disabilities? Can you vote if you've been diagnosed with a disability?

The answer is maybe. Since voting laws are still partially determined by each state, your best resource is your local election website. The information below, however, may help determine your eligibility.

#### Americans With Disabilities Act

According to the Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA), anyone with a mental disability who has an understanding of what it means to vote is allowed to vote in federal elections. Being diagnosed with a short or long-term disability does not directly impact your right to vote as a U.S. citizen, but your ability to vote could be affected by the state you live in.

The word "disability" can have numerous connotations. but many definitions include the idea that a disability is a condition that limits an individual mentally and/or physically, and may affect sensory, movement, and processing skills. A disability could be anything from a short-term injury to long-term impairment.

#### Help America Vote Act (HAVA)

Passed by Congress in 2002, HAVA created standards and procedures that states follow for federal elections.

Some of the programs and procedures started by HAVA:

• States must keep databases for statewide voter registration (except in North Dakota where registration is not required).

• States must have processes for proper voter identification.

- Voter information must be readily available.
- The Election Assistance Commission (EAC) must conduct research to help improve elections.
- Voter equipment must be tested and certified.

HAVA is meant to help with all aspects of voting and requires that states provide accessible voting locations for people with disabilities to participate in federal elections. If there isn't a fully accessible location, voters must be given an alternative location they can go to. Or, voters must be given another option for voting on or before election day.

In 1996, CLC Foundation, Inc. was one of the first non-profits in New York State to establish a Pooled Supplemental Needs Trust with the help of Community Living Corporation, Inc. Today, the Trusts are among the oldest and largest in New York State.

### DID YOU KNOW ....

CLC Foundation pays out \$3,000,000 in distributions each year on behalf of our trust clients. These disbursements afford beneficiaries greater independence, comfort and personal fulfillment.

CLC participants in the trusts utilize their pooled supplemental needs trust accounts for a variety of approved expenditures, including to fund vacations with *Creative Escapes* and to join recreational activities such as *Hidden Treasures*.

CLCFoundation currently employs three trust officers. Our officers are responsible for maintaining compliance with state and federal regulations; building strong relationships with the beneficiaries and most of all, maintaining participants' eligibility for all public entitlements such as Medicaid and Social Security benefits. Beneficiaries should reach out to their trust officer to discuss individual needs and concerns.
