Sadly, we were forced to cancel our Hidden Treasures Performance for the second time in just a few months. There's just no cutting of corners with this virus and its newcomer variants.

Even though the virus may seem to be weakening, it remains highly contagious and possibly dangerous, especially to those with preexisting medical conditions.

A couple of weeks ago, OPWDD released the Workforce Incentive Payments to eligible direct care staff. This is a plan to support and stabilize the direct care staff by providing funds to acknowledge the work they do and encourage them to stay employed in this sector.

The money was distributed via a complicated protocol which basically provided more money to those who worked most. It also served to recognize the efforts of all staff in a very Emotionally Intelligent manner.
